THE PEOPLE AND TIMES OF WESTERN PENNSYLVANIA

compiled and indexed by Clara E. Duer

A day by day story of events from July 1786 to February 1797, as reported in the Pittsburg Gazette newspaper. Contains full abstracts from the newspapers of marriages, deaths, run-aways, court cases, land sales, military deserters, indentured servants, advertisements for merchants, blacksmiths, gunsmiths, strayed and lost animals, tax lists of delinquents, ferryboat schedules, letters held at local post offices, and divorces. RED ROCK LINE

The land east of the line was to be open to white settlement in 1843, but that west of the line remained Indian Territory until 1845. Troops were stationed along the line to see that no settler should cross until midnight, October 11th. As guns were fired announcing the time, covered wagons drawn by oxen rattled over the frozen ground. Men on horseback swept by with torches flaring, claims were paced off in darkness, campfires built, stakes driven.

THE PEDIGREE NUMBERING SYSTEM

Beginning with this issue of the Tracer we would like to print at least one family chart using the pedigree numbering system.



- #1 is you, or the subject of the pedigree being presented
- #2 is your father
- #3 is your mother
- #4 is your paternal grandfather
- #5 is your paternal grandmother
- #6 is your mother's father
- #7 is your mother's mother, etc.

In this system, every male ancestor has an even number and every female has an odd number. A wife's number is one more than her husband's; a mother's number is double that of her child, plus one.

ON SEARCHING FOR FRIENDS _____

The Society of Friends (Quakers) originated in Penn's Quaker Colony and they migrated to various parts of America. The organization of the church consisted of Meetings of Worship which reported to a Monthly Meeting (MM). A group of Monthly Meetings made up a Quarterly Meeting which in turn reported to a Yearly Meeting. The records of the Monthly Meetings are the ones of most importance to the genealogist because here were recorded births, deaths, and marriages as well as relocations, admissions, and dismissals of members.

Quakers refused to swear by oath, so many states gave them the right to "affirm" legal documents rather than take an oath. If you find the phrase "by affirmation" in legal documents, you can be sure that person was a Quaker. They also objected to the system of using the names of pagan gods to designate the days and months, so the dating of legal papers, birth and death dates, etc., by a phrase such as "the third day of the tenth month "3rd dy, 10th mo) also is an indication that a Quaker was involved.

Very complete records of the MM have been preserved and can be found in the various volumes by William Wade Hinshaw as well as the collections at the Rhode Island Historical Society, 121 Hope Street, Providence, Rhode Island 02906, and The Friends Historical Collection, The Library, Guilford College, Greensboro, N.C. 27410. TAKE NOTE: That "1st mo" was March.



VETERANS HOME OF CALIFORNIA will do a record search on relatives who were residents of the Home and who died prior to 1945. Information is in the Great Registers and Medical Records. If Home Members died after 1945, the Medical Records Statistical Office must be contacted. These later records may still be considered confidential. The Records give name & address of next of kin (or friend), date & place of enlistment, discharge, rank, company, regiment, vessel, length of service, cause of discharge, battles or engagements. The cost of the search is \$15 (make checks payable to Museum Fund), if no record is found there is no charge. Contact Dept of Vet Affairs, Veterans Home of CA, Yountville, Napa Co., CA 94599, (707) 944-4279. Editor's Note: These are excellent reports.

DELAYED BIRTH CERTIFICATES

One may check courthouse records for delayed birth files. Birth certificates have been filed many years after the event by people who do not have an original one on record. Proof of baptism or family Bible records are also used to certify the event. Delayed birth records were needed to certify birth dates for Social Security. Genealogy Digest Summer 1985

"The First Monument Dedicated to George Washington"

Located southeast of Hagerstown, in Washington County, Maryland,
the hilltop monument was constructed by the citizens of Boonsboro,
Maryland, in July, 1827, to honor the nation's first President and the
"Father of his Country." Built of native stone, the structure was
restored in 1882 and again in 1920, before it came under the auspices of
the State of Maryland. High atop South Mountain in the Catoctin range,

CHURCH RECORDS

Some nineteenth century church marriage records were turned in to the government and are at the Archives. These are indexed. Some churches may still have records and if the denomination of an ancestor is known, churches can be contacted. As records are usually chronological, an approximate date is necessary.

COURT RECORDS

Court records are available from 1842. The primary series with genealogical information are the probate records, including wills. These are available for the following years: (Indexes available.)

Probate cases sometimes were filed many years after death if land titles had to be adjudicated, so date of filing does not correspond to date of death. Probates for residents of other islands may have been filed in the First Circuit.

Other types of cases which may have genealogical information are Civil, Law, and Equity (which may include disputes over land titles) and Divorce. Generally, case records prior to 1900 are in the State Archives and later records in the Circuit Courts.

DEATHS

Registration of deaths was first required by law in 1859, but few records exist before the responsibility was given to the Department of Health in 1896. Records are in that office as follows:

Information is available to direct descendants or persons with a specified relationship. A fee is charged for a search whether or not a record is found.

Obituaries appeared in newspapers as early as 1836 and there is an index in the Archives for 1836 to 1950. Newspapers indexed were primarily English language papers published in Honolulu. The printed index to the Honolulu Advertiser and Honolulu Star Bulletin issued by the State Library includes obituaries from 1929 to date. In both cases, obituaries, not death notice columns, are indexed and are selective. Death notices for prominent persons may be indexed as a news item rather than under obituaries. The information in published obituaries and on death certificates is based on facts furnished by informants, and is only as accurate as the information available to them. A microfilm copy of the Archives index and the printed indexes are available at the State Library and the regional libraries.

Few cemeteries in Hawaii have records of nineteenth or early twentieth century burials. Oahu Cemetery, started in the 1840s, does have records. Burials there are primarily haole and part-haole families. For other cemeteries, when it is known that one member of a family is buried there, a search of tombstones may reveal information on others.

IMMIGRATION

Records of immigration to Hawaii from 1842 to June 1900 are at the State Archives, and a card index is available.

Immigration records after 1900 including Koreans, Okinawans, Russians, Spanish, Puerto Ricans and later groups of Portuguese, Japanese and Chinese, are with the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service. In order to obtain information, request must specify name of ship and date and port of arrival.

Hawaiian Sugar Planters Association has records on Filipino laborers brought in between 1906 and 1941. It includes date of arrival, plantation assignment, family members, and departures.

Records of Japanese immigrants were kept by the Japanese Consulate from 1885 to 1910. The Japanese Consulate has retained the index; the Hawaii Immigration Heritage Center, Bishop Museum, has the passenger lists. These records are of particular value because they may include the village as well as the prefecture of origin.

LAND RECORDS

The records of land transactions may include genealogical information but of varying kinds depending on the type of transaction.

Ownership of land by individuals began with the Mahele in 1848, and original land titles are either Land Commission Awards (LCA) with a Royal Patent of Confirmation (RP) which are based on claims to a right to the land before 1848 or Grants (Gr.) which were purchases of land from the government. Records concerning land with an LCA number, including the testimony and register of documents concerning the claim, are in the State Archives and may contain information on who first used the land and the relationship to the claimant. Testimony and register of documents are either Foreign (English) or Native (Hawaiian). The Hawaiian testimony and registers have been translated.

A Grant will seldom contain genealogical information as it was a straight business transaction between an individual and the government.

Transactions concerning land after the original title was received are recorded at the Bureau of Conveyances. Records of transfer may give relationships, such as grandparent to grandchild, or parent to child. Land deeds may reveal a wife's name as her approval to a sale was necessary to relinquish her dower rights.

The Land Court also has useful information for those pieces of land for which a Land Court title has been issued. These are identified by a Land Court Application number (Ld. Ct. App.). In order to obtain such a title, a complete abstract of land ownership must be filed. This would include both land purchases and inheritance. Therefore, records might contain genealogical information on former owners of all or part of the land. Records are at the Land Court, Kekuanooa Building.

MARRIAGES

Registration of marriages has been the responsibility of the Department of Health since 1896. Prior to that time, responsibility was in several agencies. However, records from these agencies which have survived are now either in the Department of Health or the State Archives. The few records preceding the first law requiring registration (1842) were kept by the missionaries who performed the

marriages. Some of these are now at the State Archives; others may still be with the churches where the ceremonies were performed. Records and indexes are available as follows:

Most pre-1900 records give names only; later records give parents, race and age.

Department of Health records are available only to the person involved, direct descendants, or persons with a specified relationship. There is a fee for each search whether or not the record is found. Names of both parties, the island and an approximate date is usually necessary to find the record.

Federal statutes up to 1949 required that all marriages performed in U.S. territories be recorded at the Circuit Courts. These records cover the years 1900-1949. Oahu, Kauai, and Hawaii certificates have been microfilmed and are available at the State Archives and the respective circuit courts. Maui certificates are available at the Maui Circuit Court, and an index is available at the State Archives.

An index to marriage notices which appeared in newspapers between 1845 and 1945 is in the Archives. A microfilm copy is available at the State Library and the regional libraries.

MILITARY RECORDS

State Archives has a card list of veterans of the Civil and Spanish American Wars who died in Hawaii prior to 1945, and a list of Hawaiian residents who served in World War I. Registers for the Citizens Guard (1893-1898) are also in the State Archives. Records of the National Guard (1898-date) are with the State Department of Defense.

NAMES

An 1860 law required use of the father's name as the family name. However, among Hawaiians and Chinese, the practice of using a single name continued for many years.

Change-of-names were authorized by the 1860 law upon approval of the king, and later, the governor. Records for changes of names, both decrees and petitions, from 1904 to current year are at the State Archives. Index to the new name for 1904-1953 is also at the Archives; for later years at the Lieutenant Governor's Office. Since 1907, decrees for changes have been registered at the Bureau of Conveyances, and are indexed under both the old and the new name.

NATURALIZATION

Naturalization records for Hawaii are available from 1844 to 1894 at the State Archives. In addition, there are denization records (1846-1898) and special rights of citizenship (1894-1895). Indexes are available.

Records of naturalization from 1900 to 1956 are in Washington, D.C. (425 I St. NW, Washington, D.C. 20536). For later records, contact local U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Office.

Anyone who was a citizen of Hawaii in 1898 automatically became a U.S. citizen. However, denization and special rights were not considered as granting Hawaiian citizenship.

Oaths of loyalty were required under the Republic of Hawaii (1894-1895), and are in the Archives.

PUBLISHED SOURCES

City directories (1880-date) are available for all islands. Information given includes address, occupation, and sometimes a death date. The names of children will begin to appear as they become adults and continue to live in the same household.

Telephone directories, which give information on where a person lived, are available from 1894 on microfiche at the Hawaii State Library.

Some genealogies have been published, primarily haole families. These include missionary families (Carter, Judd, Lyman, Wilcox, Thurston, and Wilder); and some prominent part-Hawaiian families (Robertson, Robinson, and Richardson among them). Some families have printed genealogies for very limited distribution and these are usually available only from family members.

Biographical dictionaries have been issued since 1917. *Men of Hawaii* (later *Men and Women of Hawaii*) 1917-1972 (6 vols.), *Chinese in Hawaii*, 1929-1956 (3 vols.), *Prominent Men in Hawaii* (primarily Japanese), (1913), *Portuguese-Hawaiian Memories* (1930), *Filipinos in Hawaii* (1937) are some of these. Information given usually includes place and date of birth, parents, spouse and children.

These are at the State Archives.

1855-1859 are school, road and poll tax only. Records are arranged by district, ahupuaa and name, or district and name, and some have a name index. These may be useful in tracing ownership of inherited lands or disposition of family lands.

Tax records after 1936 are by tax key number, not by name, and give only assessments and payments.

SPECIAL SOURCES FOR ETHNIC GROUPS

Chinese

In addition to the immigration records, there are special records on the Chinese in the 1890s in the State Archives, because there were special laws concerning them. After 1886, special permits were issued to Chinese who went back to China and planned to return. Hawaii-born children who went to China had to have special permits to return. Women and merchants were given special permits. Indexes are available for some of the records.
