An Aid To Organizing Family Reunions

The first decision to have a family reunion is probably the most significant. Family members have expressed a desire to get together and see each other once in a while, good. Corner those members and start your committee. You may decide to do it yourself, which is good because only you will have to make the decisions. On the other hand, it is better to involve a larger group of people who in turn contact others. They are also a better source for additional members and addresses.

It really is a very simple project. Only the committee can make it more involved. The first item is the date.

Date: If you are only involving family members who are within a 100 or so miles, a six-month date would be adequate. However, if there are members scattered around the U.S. a first notice of eight months is not too long. Some reunions are planned two years in advance. Summer dates are the most used but if a special anniversary or birthday of an elder member of the family is appropriate, by all means use it.

Place: Ordinarily a centralized location would be the best. Small groups may be accommodated in backyards or patios. City recreational parks which are for rent are excellent. Swimming pools in the vicinity are helpful but not necessary. A place for children to play should be of primary concern as they are the ones who will be asking about the next reunion.

Time: The earlier the better in the day, as some will want to visit. Will also depend on the location.

Start Up Money: One of the biggest items for the committee to decide. Locations which are rented generally have deposits requested. Experience with a first reunion will depend on the committee, after the first reunion there should be enough money left over and this can be used for the next reunion. There is also the expense of the printing and mailing of the first notice.

Experience has shown to ask the members of the committee to pay their share of the expected donation in advance and their family credited at the time of the reunion.

Suggestions are that an entire family of two or more would pay a flat fee. Singles another fee and some older members past a certain age to be guests.

Invitations:

At the time of the first notice members of the family who are invited would be asked to send in their donations at that time. The notice would also indicate whether the subject family was intending to attend. (Good idea to know approximately how many will attend.) Second notice will give place and time and any particulars decided upon after first notice.

Food:

This is another decision by the committee; a main dish, or BBQ item could be paid for by the committee. Family members could be asked to bring along a pot-luck dish to share. Drinks could either be furnished or again members bring their own (it all depends on how much the committee wants to take on). Tableware: plates, silverware, etc. should also be brought by individual families. This is a time and effort saver for the committee.

Entertainment:

Games for children of all ages is highly recommended. Special games that are performed from one reunion to another are easily remembered. Prizes are not necessary, but giving the children something to do while elders are visiting is primary. Water balloon toss during the summer is excellent to involve all.

Musical family members can be asked to bring instruments for informal jam sessions.

Family story tellers could be invited to tell their stories.

Family History:

A family tree made up on large butcher paper or done by computer and on 8x11 paper for family members.

Tape recorders should be brought and older members of family asked for their stories.

Video taping is a fun way to preserve the day.

Old family pictures may be displayed.

Miscellaneous:

One member of the committee should be delegated to keep the addresses and mail the invitations. The same member could be assigned the task of taking and recording the donations and the treasury. This simplifies the accounting. Savings accounts can be opened to hold the money and withdrawals made for the expenses. Two signatures on withdrawals is advised.

Lapel buttons can be ordered with date, etc. on them.

Family cook book can be organized with family recipes (this takes a long time).

Tee Shirts with family name or logo and date. First notice advises members what to order and prices.

There are many more ideas for family reunions, this is only a guide. Family reunions can be held in restaurants, or hotels. The idea is to get started and involve as many family members as possible. You may want to include other activities at your family reunion, by all means get creative and have fun!

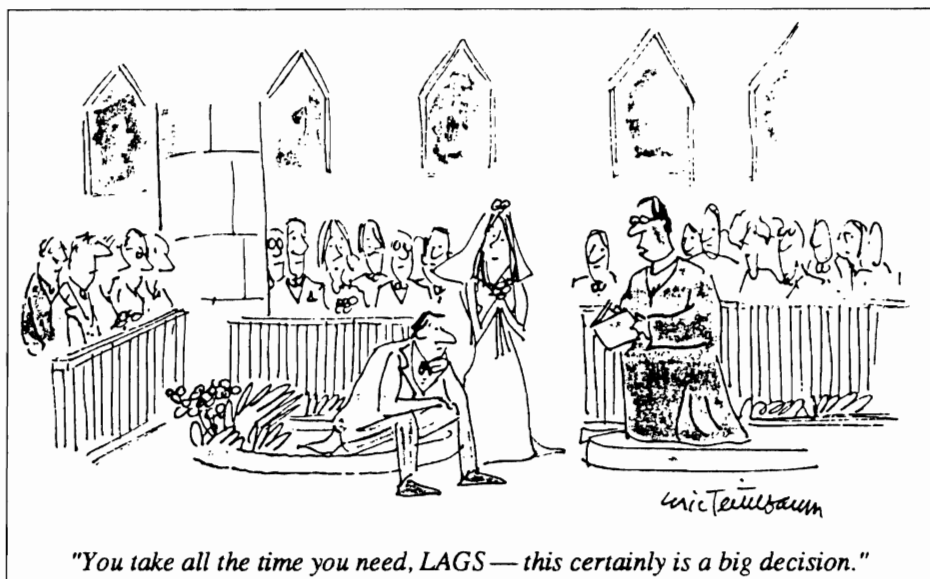

Truly a massive amount of data — on 34,000 indexed persons — is gathered into this book. Marriage records from five sources were compiled by the author. Each marriage is listed twice, once under the groom's surname, and again under the bride's. The marriage date, birth dates of the individuals when known, and book and page citation of the source are also listed.

The Woodville Republican, Mississippi's oldest existing newspaper. 1991. By O'Levia Neil Wilson Wiese. Published by Heritage Books (address above). 283+ix pages, 5x9 inches, soft cover, indexed. \$21. Review copy donated by the publisher.

Woodville is in the southwestern corner of Mississippi, just south of Natchez. On a visit to the region several years ago, we learned that before the Civil War Natchez had more millionaires than any other city in the US, all because of King Cotton. It is clear from the antebellum newspaper abstracts printed in this book that Woodville business life also centered around plantations, slaves and cotton.

The Woodville Republican started in 1823 and is still being published. This book, covering 1840-1847, is the author's second volume of genealogical abstracts from the paper. The 2000-name index is by surname only, except for slaves, who are listed by first name, since only white folks had surnames.

Lyman Draper is beloved by historians and genealogists for his lifelong packratting of original documents about frontier America. Among Draper's manuscripts is the transcription of an oral narrative by Lewis Bonnett, Jr. Bonnett was the cousin of Lewis Wetzel, described by Prof. Lobdell as the "leading Indian-killer in the 'Heroic Age' on the Upper Ohio."

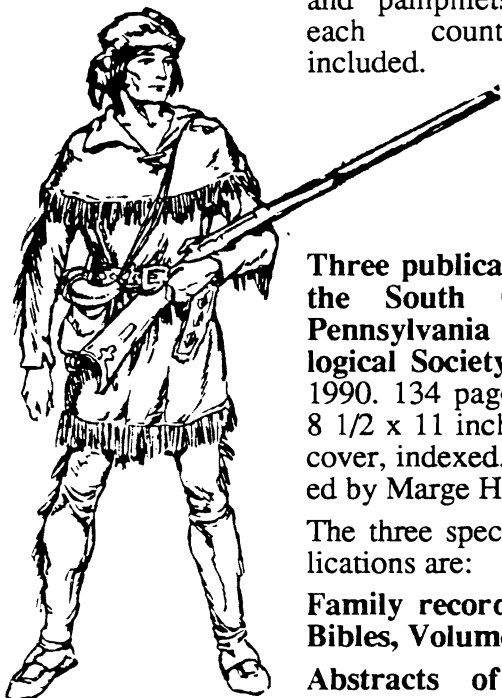
"Leading Indian-killer" was a highly complimentary epithet in Bonnett's time, in the late 1700s and early 1800s. Prof. Lobdell does not use the phrase approvingly (he says he is part Native American himself), but the Bonnett stories he has edited seem to average one red and one white murder per page. For example, Bonnett tells casually about the time Wetzel went out to hunt Indians, almost as if for sport. "On his return he was asked what luck? His reply was that he had treed three Indians, but had got but two of them, and pulled the scalps out of his shot pouch."

There isn't much genealogy in this book, but the history is as raw as a freshly scalped skull.

This slim book consists of 13 chapters, each about one of the counties of East Central Wisconsin. Each chapter summarizes the history of that county, then lists local libraries, genealogical societies, historical societies, museums, and newspapers. A bibliography of published books and pamphlets about each county is included.

All three books are indexed, but by surname only. Not surprisingly in this "Pennsylvania Dutch" region, most of the names in the indexes are German.

True and Bevers (Beavers), with brief data on allied families of Clack, Hill, Slayden, Glasscock, Pistole. 1983. By Odessa Morrow Isbell. Published by Gainesville Printing, Gainesville, Texas. 302+vi pages, 8 1/2 x 11 inches, hard cover, illustrated, indexed. \$40. From an anonymous donor.

The LAGS library committee decided several years ago not to purchase or accept donations of family histories, because so many are available and because the small number we could acquire would only by chance be of interest to any of our members. We have made exceptions, however, and this book is one of them, because it is so well done that it can be used as a model for our members to emulate. Everything is done right — documentation; numbering system; indexing; quantity and quality of photographs, maps and documents; typography, layout, printing and binding.

At today's prices this book would cost at least \$60, which is probably more than we would want to ask our relatives to pay. However, many of the quality features of this book cost nothing but time and patience, and they are worth imitating.

High-tech aid for Civil War historic project

A joint effort is underway by the Federation of Genealogical Societies, the National Archives, the National Park Service and the Genealogical Society of Utah to computerize 5.5 million names on the master index of records pertaining to the 3.5 million individuals who fought in the Civil War. (The discrepancy in the numbers occurs because many soldiers served in more than one regiment during the war, names were sometimes spelled differently for different periods of service and some soldiers used aliases.)

This historic project, called Civil War Soldiers System, will make information available to the 11 million annual visitors to the Civil War parks, monuments, battlefields and cemeteries, administered by National Park Service. Visitors often wonder if their ancestors fought or died at the sites they are visiting. By 1994, they will be able to get immediate answers to their questions by using the computerized data base.

Initially, the Civil War Soldiers System will contain the name of every soldier who fought in the Civil War, along with such information as whether the soldier was Confederate or Union and the soldier's regiment and rank. The system will also provide information on the 7,000 regiments and units formed during the war and on many of the 10,500 battles and skirmishes. It also will provide the location of every identified Civil War soldier buried in a cemetery that is managed by the National Park Service.

Each Civil War park will have one or more microcomputers

available for use. At some sites a park interpreter may operate the system; at others the visitor may do it. All a visitor will need to know is the name of the soldier. If only the surname is known, the system will provide information about all soldiers of that name and will display all the types of records that it has for the name entered. It also will direct the inquirer to additional information about the regiments and battles related to the name entered.

"This project — to make vital information about Civil War veterans electronically available — could have an enormous impact on students, scholars and genealogists interested in the Civil War," said Don W. Wilson, archivist of the United States.

The Genealogical Society of Utah is developing the data entry software for this project, while the National Archives will supply microfilm copies of the master index of the Civil War soldiers, and the Federation of Genealogical Societies will coordinate

volunteers who will input the data for the Civil War Soldiers Index. FGS estimates that the data entry will take about three years, and the Park Service plans to have the system operational by 1994.

FGS currently is establishing a nationwide network of coordinators to organize and oversee the Civil War Soldiers Index project, according to Glade Nelson, president of the organization. This work will be done at specific locations around the country, such as the regional branches of the National Archives and on IBM-compatible home computers.



COUNTY SOURCES - NEW YORK

In New York State the individual county land is divided into Cities and Towns, and each Town is further divided into Villages. The individual Villiage may actually be quite a large town but it is still technically called a Village.

Most of New York's counties annually publish and sell a small booklet listing the County, City, Town and Village Officers, which include the County and Town Historians. These Historians are a very real asset when researching New York as they are supposed to answer all inquiries received.

Included often in these Ready Reference County booklets is a fee schedule for most county services. Example: marriage record, search of court record, certified copy of court documents, copies of deeds.

These county booklets are well worth writing for. Sent \$1.00-\$2.00 to the County Clerk of the County you're interested in and request their Ready Reference guide to the County.

"RED GUIDES" Another marvelous aid in finding where records are located is the so-called "Red Guide" series. These guides are published by the New York Historical Resources Center, Olin Library, Cornell University, Ithaca, NY 14853. The official title of this "Red Guide" is GUIDE TO HISTORICAL RESOURCES IN ---COUNTY, NEW YORK, REPOSITORIES.

The "Red Guides" inventory historical and genealogical material in libraries and historical societies(open to the public) within that particular county. It would certainly cut down on your letter writing if you knew the exact location of the record you desired.

The guides have deep red,paper covers, bound at the top and range in price from \$3/4.00 to \$20.00 Advance payment is not required. Order the County Guide you want and they will send you an invoice. (No. 53, January 1988; Immigrant Genealogical Society; page 5)
