


Chart of Denominational Development

Many helpful hints can be found in the Family Tree Newsletter.

Are you doing research in Pa.? Write to the Dept. of Community Affairs, Harrisburg, Pa. for their free packet of genealogical material including: Genealogical Maps of counties, information concerning records of genealogical interest, genealogical research in the state library of Pa.

Catalog on basic reference books on genealogy, heraldry and local history. Write to the Genealogical Publishing Co., lll Water Street, Baltimore, Maryland, 21202- for free catalog.

Hoenstein Rental Library, 414 Montgomery St., Hollidayburg, Pa.16648. If you had ancestors from Pa. write them telling the names, county they were from and approximate time they lived there. They will advise as to whether he has books on the family. They charge deposit on each book, you can keep it for 30 days, return it and they refund 75% of your deposit. The other 25% they keep for rental fee.

Maryland-If you had ancestors here try this source of information: The Land Office, Hall of Records Bldg; Annapolis, Md. 21401. It has custody of all land pantents, grants and surveys, proprietary, rent rolls, chancery papers and some other court records. They have index that lists the tracts by name in each county and refers to the patent or grants or surveys.

Note: Lucile White has Hoenstein's Catalog, which includes the index or surnames in the books Hoensteins rents and sells. She is willing to give anybody information from this catalog, or let them borrow it. Good way to make a connection with a fellow researcher. Lucile's telephone number is 455-0550.

Surname exchange-William A. McCormick, 38623 Lancaster, Livonia, Michigan 48154, who we suggested writing for surname exchanges, now has a \$1.00 charge, plus a SASE for his service. It is still a good opportunity to make connections.
