LIBRARY NOTES

Have you visited our library recently? New material is arriving monthly. We have just received over 50 research papers by the Genealogical Society of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. (A list of these is included. Please save it for further reference.)

New books are:

Ship Passenger Lists, Carl Boyer; three volumes. National and New England (1600-1825) New York and New Jersey (1600-1825) The South (1538-1825)

Thirty Thousand Names of Immigrants in Pennsylvania 1727-1776, I. Daniel Rupp

If you find your ancestor in Rupp's book, you can get additional information by checking <u>Pennsylvania German Pioneers</u> by Strassburger and Hinke. It is available at San Francisco Public Library. The call number is 325.24/St 81p. Strassburger's book contains the names on three different documents that the immigrant signed when he landed. Spellings varied greatly on these lists depending on the recorder. The book also contains a description of the travelers' trip from Germany through Holland to America.

The Livermore library has two boxes of genealogical pamphlets which are not catalogued individually in the card catalogue. They are located on the side wall. Titles are as varied as, <u>The Dutch System of Naming</u> and <u>Long Island</u> <u>Source Materials</u>.

If you have any suggestions for books, let a member of the book selection committee know.

TO SUTRO BY BART?

Since BART is on strike, the planned BART trip has been postponed. Here is how to get there, when we plan to go as a group or as individuals.

Either ride BART bus to Bayfair or Hayward. Board BART train for Daly City. Get off either Montgomery Street or Powell Street stations. Go up to Market Street and catch a San Francisco Muni bus, No. 5 Fulton Street. This bus will be going up Harket. Well the operator to let you off at Parker Street (you will have just passed a large church on Fulton St. and Parker). Go to your right down Parker St. to Colden Gate Ave. Turn right across Parker and go down Golden Gate one block to Temescal St. on your left. Sutro Library will then be to your immodiate right.

To go to San Francisco Civic Library at Larkin and McAllister, catch No. 5 Fulton at Powell or Montgomery St. BART Stations and get off the bus at Larkin. The library is on your left.

To return downtown, you catch the No. 5 bus where you got off, but going opposite directions and get off at Fifth St. and Market, which is the Powell St. BART station.

Riding BART-SAMTRANS to San Bruno National Archives

Ride Daly City BART train to Daly City. Go to Samtrans Bus stops. Go to front bus stop and catch either No. 3 B which goes to San Francisco Airport or No. 5 L which goes to Palo Alto. Either bus stops at "Tanforan" shopping center. This stop is 100 yards from Sneath Lane and El Camino Real. Go back to Sneath Lane, turn left, go one block to Commodore, turn left one block, right one block and National Archives Building will be to your immediate left front. You must then go to front of building to enter. It is four blocks to walk if you ride Samtrans. To return, you catch No. 3 B or 5M northbound to Daly City.
