MARYLAND GENEALOGICAL AID

Maryland is noted for having so much genealogical and historical records available for the public. The Hall of Records at Annapolis was built as part of the tercentenary celebration. Every state, county, city, town or other public official in Maryland is authorized to deposit in the Hall of Records, any paper, books, documents, etc. He is <u>required</u> to deposit ALL records in his custody created before April 28, 1788, the date the state was created.

The Hall of Records will furnish for a small fee photostat, typewritten or microfilm copies of any documents in its custody. All the material at the Hall of Records are available for use by the public, subject to such regulations for their safekeeping as has been adopted by the commission. Inquiries received by mail will be answered if the research required is confined to the use of their extensive indexes, however, no family line will be traced, nor will any record be evaluated for genealogical purposes. (Mail \$5 with the inquiry. When search is completed and bill is sent for copies the \$5 is returned. Searches usually take around six weeks.)

In addition, some counties had rent rolls, debt books, special petitions or assessments. All federal census are available, from 1790 to 1900, some of them indexed.

All land parcels were given a name at the time of the grant. This name was to be retained down through the years. This is a big advantage when trying to identify different members of a family, from generation to generation. All land records are located at the Hall of Records, PO Box 828, Annapolis, Maryland. Some wills are kept in the county court houses but the older ones, pre-1850 are at the Hall of Records.

Maryland Publications

Robert Barnes has compiled four books of marriages in Maryland data from the Hall of Records, church records and newspapers.

Gaius M. Brumbaugh has compiled many military, church, marriage, and cemetery records into his "MARYLAND RECORDS, COLONIAL, REVOLUTION AND CHURCH".

James M. Magruder compiled the MARYLAND COLONIAL ABSTRACTS, WILLS, ACCOUNTS AND INVENTORIES. He also made an INDEX OF MARYLAND COLONIAL WILL, 1634-1777 in the Hall of Records.

There are 8 volumes of MARYLAND CALENDER OF WILLS by Jane Baldwin Cotton.

EARLY SETTLERS OF MARYLAND, From 1633-1680 was compiled by Gust Skordas.

Many church records, Quaker and Church of England and others have been microfilmed and can bee found in the Hall of Records or in the LDS records at Salt Lake City.
