EVER WONDER WHAT HAPPENED TO THE MAYFLOWER?

After carrying the Pilgrims to America the Mayflower made a second voyage carrying slaves to the new and the theory disappeared for over three centuries. VALLEY ROOTS

TESLA

A large part of central California was covered by a large inland freshwater sea along the borders of which were areas of lush vegetive growth---a hundred million years ago. This area developed into large coal deposits on which the fame of free a rests. Little else remains but the name of the once thriving coal wining fown in the southeastern part of Alameda County in Central California

Named for the inventor, Nikoli Tesla, the town was built by the Treadwell brothers who had made their fortune in the gold fields of Alaska at Treadwell Island, near Juneau. Coal had been discovered as early as 1857 in the area that was to become Corral Hollow, but it was not utilized until the Treadwell brothers bought the land from the Eureka Coal Mining Company and the Cardiff Coal and Land Company. Some \$2,000,000 was invested to make a town for the mining operation.

By 1897 Tesla was a company town. Coupons were issued against the mine workers wages, (about \$2.50 per day) and only these coupons could be used for purchases in the town. Anyone found to be buying supplies in nearby Tracy or Livermore was the immediate dismissal from the mines.

There were all the necessities in Tesla--a barber shop, cobbler, drygoods and General Store, laundry, Post Office, Library and reading room, hospital, hotel, and saloons. For entertainment the town had a Baseball Club, Home Talent Club, Social Club, The Bicycle Club, and the Cornet Band from which the 1200 to 2000 population could choose.

Different areas of the town had a name--Harrietville, Jimtown, Frytown, Chinatown, Dark town, Treadwell Row, and the main part of town called Tesla Flat where the bandstand and flagpole were located. 30.00

Lumber for building came from Banden, Oregon by boat to Mowry's Landing near Mission San Jose. Captain John McQuoid of Canada piloted a ship delivering lumber -- he later married Mary Ann Treadwell. The town had electricity and water was supplied by an artesian well. Steam from the mine engines supplied power for cooking and washing at the hotel. For transportation there was a stage twice daily from Ryan's Livery Stable on South Livermore Avenue in Livermore, and the Wells Fargo Stage had a route between Livermore and Tracy through Tesla, daily. The 15 mile trip to Tracy or Livermore meant staying overnight if much time was spent socially or conducting business.

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The school was located on the flat area of the canyon. Miss MacMurray and Miss Harkness were teachers in 1901. A Mrs. Smiley taught in 1902.

There was a Protestant church and Mt. Carmel Catholic Church. Father Whibbs was the first pastor at Mt. Carmel in 1899, later Father Lacey in 1900 and Father O'Connell in 1901. The Alter Society included Miss Dell Leary, President, Mrs. Burke, Financial Secretary, Mrs. Leimeux, Treasurer. First teachers were Mrs. Leimeux, Kate and Dell Leary, Mrs. McCormick, Mrs. Colford, Mrs. Charles Donahue, and Mrs. Paul Hubener.

With the advent of cheap and it is is oil, the demand for coal fell off, and the mine was essentially shut down by 1906.

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of wine making and a 30-year span of hop growing in the valley. The display features equipment, photographs and other artifacts relating to the history of such valley wineries as Olivina, Mount-Rogue and Kottinger, Garatti, Raboli, Crusto Blanca and Ruby Hill, and all the wineries currently in operation

SOBRIQUETS AND NICKNAMES

These terms refer to names given in place of real names. They have almost the same meaning, although their origins are diverse. Sobriquet is a French word of uncertain derivation; it is sometimes explained as having originally meant at affront. Sobriquets may be applied, not only to individuals, but, in some cases, to nations or to an imaginary person representing a nation, such as Uncle Sam, Jack Canuck or John Bull.

Nickname is derived from an Old English term -ekename-"additional name" or "surmane" "Am ekenor" ' pronounced like "a nekename", this later became nickname.

Nicknames arise in ways . Ambrous to list, but their essential features are that they should be graphic and a certain familiarity about them which makes them easy to use and enduring.

The foll; wing are some commone Sobriquets:

ALMIGHTY DOLLAR. The earliest use of this Americanism is attributed to Washington Irving. It is to be found in A Creole Villiage, published in 1837. It expresses the old idea of the power of wealth. BEGGARS. A nickname applied to deputies in Holland who protested against the establishment of the Inquisition in 1556. The name was BEGGARS. later adopted by the Dutch patriots.

CANUCKAN A mame applied to Canadians. It referred earlier to Canadians of French descent, but outside of Canada, and more recently in Canada, its use has now widened to include any inhabitant of that country. The origin of the name is uncertain. Some scholars derive it from an Indian word; others say that it was originally applied by to French to the English and is a corruption of Connaught.
