



[New member, Charla MAULDIN, joined our group when she saw our quarterly in the Dublin Library. She is a computer user having started with the Amiga and later switching to the Tandy 1200 (hard disc). She uses Roots II and Wordstar and even has a modum to access the Roots Bulletin Board!]

My father had a knack for bringing the past alive when he told stories of his youthful adventures. When he died I realized what a wonderful world of the past my children would never know. And for the first time I became curious about the lives of my ancestors - where they came from, why, and what their lives were like.

I am Charla MAULDIN. I was born and raised in northern CA. My husband, T.Paul MAULDIN, was born in Albuquerque and grew up in N.M. and CO. He is an electrical engineer. We have three children: Daniel, age 5, Kristin, age 9, and Joel, age 12.

My father, Charles LITTLE, was born in Douglas Co. WA in 1909 and grew up there. He was adopted by Eugene LITTLE. Eugne's folks (his mother was a PLUMBLEY) lived in NY, MI, WA and OR. My grandmother, Cora Mable HORNSECK,

was born Dec.1890 in Silverbow Co. MT, the daughter of John HORNBECK of Hancock Co. IL and Priscilla E.THOMAS of Compton, IL. They lived in WA and OR. Priscilla's mother was a MULUGAN.

Most of my reasearch has been done on my mother's lines. She is Edythe Lavina MC PHERSON, dau. of Logan MC PHERSON and Lena Mae JONES, both born and raised in OR. The MC PHERSON line has been traced back several generations to Daniel MC PHERSON who emigrated from Dalradia, Argylshire, Scotland to Charles Co. MD where he lived until his death in 1741. His son, Richard, married Eleanor BARTON whose family tree has been traced back quite a few generations in England. The MC PHERSON family migrated to TN in the late 1700's where they intermarried with the KINCHELOE, CANTERBURY and WICKLIFFE families.

The WICKLIFFE line traces back to David (de) WYCKLIFFE who came to America from England in 1635 via the Evelyn Expedition. Other surnames are CULLEN, SISSON, HALE, WILLIAMS and FRITH.

In the mid-1808's Charles MC PHERSON came to CA and made a fortune, some say in gold, others say cattle. He returned east to pay off debts that his relatives owed. His son, Colburn MC PHERSON, married Martha Susan PEARCE/PIERCE in Santa Rosa CA in 1868, then later moved to Wasco Co. OR. Susie's father was John PEARCE/PIERCE, who wearing a suit completely handmade by his wife, attended the inauguration of his first cousin, Franklin PIERCE, as 14th President of the United States.

Steven JONES, grandfather of Lena Mae, remains something of a mystery. An excellent hunter and trapper, he showed up in Oregon in the mid-1800's and married a girl surnamed COX. When she died after having one son, he married her sister, Mary. All of the sons except one were named for famous generals. George Washington JONES was Lena's father.

Her mother was Lavina JACKSON. Lavina's father was Andrew JACKSON, son of Abraham. Andrew was born in Wilson Co. TN in 1822. His family moved to St.Clair Co. IL where in 1845/6 his father and step-mother were killed by Indians. He married Mary Ann ENGLE, dau. of William ENGLE, and brought his family to Oregon by wagon train in the early 1850's. The ENGLE family can be traced back to Melchor ENGLE who came to America in the early 1700's from Germany. He lived in Lancaster Co. PA until about 1753 when he moved to Frederick Co. VA (Jefferson Co. W.VA.) Other surnames in that family are EDMONSON, BUTT, DARKE and BEYERLE.

Paul's family lived in Alabama before the Civil War. His grandfather, William Andrew MAULDIN, was a captain in the Confederate Army and spent eleven months as a prisoner of war. In 1867 he and his family moved to Texas. One brother settled in West Texas, and the rest of the family settled in Red River Co. near Clarksville. Paul's great-grandmother, who came to Texas with them, was a REDWINE and immigrated here from Holland.

Paul's mother's line are JOHNSONs from TX, OK and IL. Other surnames are THOMAS, JUDD (KY) and ROSS (KY). Both his mother, Mae E. JOHNSON and his father, Emit Gober MAULDIN, were born in Texas.

SPRING CLEANING by Shirley Terry (829-7787)

Sooner or later, we all seem to find ourselves in possession of family history or heirlooms that do not pertain to our family and would like to pass the item on to someone who will treasure it. Some suggestions: watch the "Genealogical Helper," both for specific descendants or for family organizations advertised that might publish your find in their newsletter; also local genealogical groups when you know a locality. I have some items I would like to share. Who knows, perhaps you are the person I'm looking for. Let me tell you several things I have and give some of the surnames involved. Call for more detailed information. [Let's make this an on-going column with a different member offering what they have to share each time. What do you have that I could use?]

- 1. SURNAMES. My Surname Folders include several that are not my direct lines so are not included in my Ancestor Chart or Surname List. My largest in this category are BROWN, MILLER and YOUNG, all with several different unconnected families of that surname.
- 2. GENEALOGIES. All are on my surname list and most have no index. Two of the largest seem to be more localized. "Samuel FRAZIER of Tennessee" has a good index and "Immel and Emel Families in America" (mostly Pennsylvania) has a lengthy contents page giving names of many spouses. I probably will not allow these books out of my sight but would be happy to bring either to a meeting if you call.
- 3. CIVIL WAR/ANDERSONVILLE. I had two direct ancestors imprisoned at Andersonville so have acquired several books including a soldier's diary published in 1864 plus quite a bit of material on the Civil War in general.
- 4. KANSAS North Central. After seeing back issues of the quarterly, "Waconda Roots and Branches," in our LAGS Library, I subscribed myself since our FINN family came from the coal mines of Columbia Co., PA. to Jewell Co., KANSAS. We recently acquired a 25-30 page handwritten manuscript of family memories by a great aunt who is the only one of that generation still living. I typed it up and wrote asking some specific questions and getting her permission for publication. Aunt Etta's memories were published this past winter and I sent her a copy as promised. I'd be proud to loan you a copy if you're interested in early life in a dugout, prairie fires, her grandmother being a midwife, and rather lengthy dissertations on such things as butchering (with an "old wive's tale" of why some young women were not allowed to help), making soap, and a history of ironing clothes over the years.
- 5. KANSAS to ?OREGON. I have a very small German book that seems to be a book of daily Bible readings which was used to record some family births and deaths. It belonged to Lestel and Marion SPARKS who lived next door to my parents in Salem, Oregon, in the 1970's A few pages have been cut and removed from the book. It originally belonged to Katharina NIKKEL of Woodson Co. Kansas who may have been born 18 Jan 1866 and died 6 Juli 1887. The most prominent names are NIKKEL, JOHNSON and KLASSEN with a couple each of HUBBARD and KROKER. The earliest date seems to be 1813 for a Peter KLASSEN.
- If I can't find a descendant (I did write to several JOHNSON quarterlies), I will give the book to the Woodson $Co.\ Historical\ Society\ in\ Yates\ Center,$

Kansas. They wrote that in the 1870-80's, a German-Russian colony of Mennonites came to Kansas settling in Marion and Woodson Counties. Peter F. NIKKEL and Katherine, his wife, came to Woodson County. Their information is that this couple was married 5 May 1874 (was she 8 years old?) in Russia just before coming to America. Both are buried in the Nikkel Burying Place at Nikkeltown, about 14 miles northwest of Yates Center. The entire colony of Mennonites left the area by 1900 with only two descendants remaining in Woodson Co. at this date. The Historical Society has a picture of Katherine and Peter NIKKEL and associates them also with a BERGMANN family. The JOHNSONS evidently came from another place but the dates span almost a hundred years beginning 1841. There are no other places mentioned but many Mennonites settled just north of Salem, Oregon, where this little book surfaced.

- If anyone is interested in a transcript of my notes, $I^{\prime}d$ be happy to send them for a SASE. I would also welcome a proofreader of illegible, faint German script as I'm sure I've made errors and omissions and the notes could be more complete.
- 6. NEBRASKA. Quarterlies from Nebraska State Gen. Society and Southeast Nebraska Gen. Society. Miscellaneous other booklets, etc. concerning state, the First Homestead in America and Gage County.
- 7. NEW JERSEY. I have a large notebook filled during my two years there with clippings of historical New Jersey places and families. Surnames with the most information are FRELINGHUYSEN, MILLER, and WALLACE. (I also have a large pedigree chart from one of my students starting with about a dozen spellings of CRUSER whose daughters married into the SCHENCK and STAATS families.) Since I was so involved with one of George Washington's many N.J. "headquarters," I also have lots on him and Martha during the Rev. years as well as some of his aides including Alexander HAMILTON.
- 8. NEW YORK. Map of "EYLAND MANATUS," more commonly know as Manhattan Island. This map is from a small, very old book entitled "Manhattan, 1624-1629" and shows the farms and Indian villages of parts of what are now New Jersey and New York before even New Amsterdam!
- 9. OHIO & KENTUCKY. Photocopied letters written to Joseph MATHIAS in Pabefore 1850 from friends and relatives in the "Western Country." Much on PHILLIPS family, also interesting description of Shaker churches.
- 10. PENNSYLVANIA Bucks County Dozens of photocopied letters written to and taped journal writings of Baptist preacher, Joseph Mathias, b.1778 and d. 1851 Eucks Co. Pa. Includes lots of genealogical info on following surnames, most especially MATTHEWS, MATHIAS, MORRIS, PHILLIPS and THOMAS. He writes at length of the very early settlement of northeastern PA. by Baptist families from Wales. If any of them interest you, call me and ask me to check my index cards for you. This material will eventually be published by the Bucks County Historical Society. They have the original journal. I have sent them all my transcriptions thus far finished. A series of four letters concerning the PHILLIPS family has also been typed and sent to a family publication by that name that promised to publish. (Surname list on following page.)


FAMILY TREE CLIMBING CAN BE FUN

CIVIL WAR PENSION RECORDS

Military records are very helpful to family researcher. Besides giving proof of military service, a pension record gives a personal description of him and can furnish clues leading to other sources. pension Civil War records booo sources 0.4 especially Place and date of entry information. into the service can help you find him in the 1850 and 1860 censuses. probably still with his parents. The place of entry may not be his actual of residence but you'll place probably find him fairly close. If not, consider why he chose to loin at that place. Maybe you'll find relatives in his company. Places of after residence discharge ususally included.

questionnaire completed by the Civil War veteran usually included names and birthdates of his full children (at least those under 18 years of age), information about his marriage(s) and any divorce information. Some have 0909 photostats of Bible records to prove the veteran's identity.

A few pension records also contain photostatic copies of the marriage license especially if the widow is claiming the pension. So you may even get the date and place of marriage and the names of their parents.

In addition to sending for direct line ancestors who served in the Civil War, don't forget his brothers and those of his wife. In my case, it was a brother's file that held a record. And an unmarried brother's pension may have been claimed by his mother, your direct Some ancestor! files. even have letters either furnished as proof of some claim or found in the personal possession οf the soldier when killed.

"When does one stop being a Civil War 'buff' and become a Civil War 'nut'?"

You should be able to get a current form at the San Bruno branch of the National Archives. Be suce to check "pension" rather than "military" records. The latter won't give you Fill out your form much genealogy. and mail to Military Service Records (NNCC), National Archives (GSA). Washington, D.C. 20408. If they do not find the record you want, there does กด bill. This necessarily mean he did not serve. Try the State Archives. possible, check the microfilmed index to military records in the National Archives. I was once told there were no records for my Emanuel SNYDER but when I happened across the index at the Oakland Morman Library, I found NINE Emanuel Snyders! From the info on the index card, I was able to quess which was mine and sent them the number. The pension record gave me a wealth of information I hadn't able to find. It have his marriage license, death date and burial place of his wife as well as his death date. It showed his death had left his three children orphans under the guardianship of their mother's father, Jacob CHARLES, and gave the birthdates and full names of the three children. Of course it gave the information on his interment and furlough? Andersonville Prison, Quite a lot of info when all I knew was that my 2nd great grandfather had been born somewhere in Pa. (imagine looking for a Snyder in Pa.!) and his father had died shortly after being sent home from the Confederate prison Andersonville.



SOLVE IT WITH SOUNDEX

years experience in twenty genealogy, I am somewhat hesitant to that I have really just "discovered" the wonders of Soundex. see, when I began my census searching twenty years ago, there didn't seem to be much need to go through the 1880 Soundex as I knew σf four sets great-grandparents were in the same county in the 1880 census, and I really wanted to search all of Gage County NE to pick up all the familiar surnames. I started with the 1880 census and worked back. There was no general 1890 census to search because of its loss and the 1900 and 1910 censuses hadn't yet been released.

This February, I decided to search the 1900 and 1910 censuses for clues on my great-grandfather Claus SIEMS. I had exhausted the usual sources.

On my first trip to the Archives in San Bruno, I still had no intention of using the Soundex. I expected to find Claus SIEMS either still living on his farm in Clatonia Twp. or in the town of Beatrice at the street address on his 1911 death certificate.

The volunteer at the Archives insisted I use the Soundex to locate him in the 1900 census. I spent an hour or so figuring out all my Soundex codes for my various surnames and trying to find Claus SIEMS under \$520 for Nebraska. I was amazed at variety of surnames that end up with the same code and finally noticed that although the last names seemed to have nothing much in common but the code, the first names were in alphabetical order . (Also, several codes are sometimes lumped together.) I went through the entire film for his code and copied down the. information from index cards on all SIEMS/SIMS/SIMES/SEIMS. I found some possible brothers for Claus, but I

I did NOT find Claus BECAUSE his youngest son was 14 in 1900 and only families with children under 10 were Soundexed! However, I was glad the volunteer had made me search the Soundex as it provided several families of the same surname in other NE. counties to follow up on.

gave me some additional also information on a Sophie SIEMS b. 1833 d.1923 who I had found listed in "Cemeteries in Lancaster Nebraska," a book in our own LAGS Library. She is in Kramer Cemetery which is in the s.w. corner township of Lancaster County neighboring my Gage County and very close to my German ancestors. In fact, one set of my gr.gr.grandparents is buried in same cemetery. Oddly. Grandmother and a first cousin both had the same maiden name of Sophia DAMKROGER and when they married brothers, they were both Sophia SIEMS so I was very curious about this third lady of the same name born 50 years earlier. This older one was just the right age to be a sister or sister-in-law to my Claus. The 1900 Soundex said she was born April 1833 in Germany and lived in the Olive Branch Precinct of Lancaster Co. as mother-in-law of Edward WEILAGE with whom she lived. I went back to our LAGS Library where I found members of the WEILAGE family buried in the same cemetery including Edward (1866-1951) and Johanne (1869-1960). Johanne's maiden name must have been SIEMS and her death certificate might be helpful to me.

But here comes my SOUNDEX BONANZA. Claus SIEMS' first wife, Caroline Helena WELTZEIN/WISCTEN, my great grandmother, died in 1890 leaving my grandfather, William, as the youngest son, age three or four. We knew Claus' second wife was Amelia/Emilie (Penn) REDMER. I was very surprised not to find her with Claus and the

children in 1900. The 1910 census tells me that Claus and Amelia had been married only six years, so I looked her up on the 1900 Soundex where I was surprised to find her as a housekeeper in Pawnee County southeast of Gage County. Since I County searched the Gage marriage records myself for his hadn't found for SONS and one came from the Ī home Claus, Archives and sent off a letter to Pawnee County to ask if Claus and Amelia were married there. return mail, came a copy of their marriage license and certificate with the modest bill of \$1.50. Claus gave his parents as John SIEMS and Mary GETNER!

Remember, somewhere out there, your elusive record is just waiting for you to figure out it's location. Keep sleuthing.

Remember, too, that sometimes the information given for such records wrong. The names of Mrs. Emelie REDMER's parents were not completed on the first writing. In a lighter ink they are shown as Carl REDMER and Dorothea ZUNKER. We have several sources that show REDMER as her married including the marriage license and certificate themselves find "Mrs" written in by hand.

mother-in-law's OWn certificate has her father given incorrectly. Her bereaved husband gave her mother's father's name. Frances FINN, instead of Harvey FISHER although he gave her mother, Grace C. FINN, correctly. He knew in-laws personally, but was tired and confused at the and time misunderstood question.



Guide to the Soundex System

The Soundex filing system, alphabetic for the first letter of surname and numeric thereunder as indicated by divider cards, keeps together names of the same and similar sounds but of variant spellings.

To search for a particular name, you must first work out the code number for the surname of the individual. No number is asigned to the first letter of the surname. If the name is Kuhne, for example, the index card will be in the "K" segment of the index. The code number for Kuhne, worked out according to the system below, is 500.

Soundex Coding Guide

Code	Key Letters and Equivalents
1	b, p, f, v
2	c, s, k, g, j, q, x, z
3	d, t
4	1
5	m, n
6	u

The letters a, e, i, o, u, y, w, and h are <u>not</u> coded. The first letter of a surname is <u>not</u> coded.

Every Soundex number must be a 3-digit number. A name yielding no code numbers, as Lee, would thus be L 000; one yielding only on code number would have two zeros added, as Kuhne, coded as K 500; and one yielding two code numbers would have one zero added, as Ebell, coded as E 140. Not more than three digits are used, so Ebelson would be coded as E 142, not E 1425.

When two key le ters or equivalents appear together, or one key letter immediately follows or precedes an equivalent, the two are coded as one letter, by a single number, as follows: Kelly, coded as K400: Buerck, coded as B620; Lloyd, coded as L300; and Schaefer, coded as S160.

If several surnames have the same code, the cards for them are arranged alphabetically by given name. There are divider cards showing most code numbers, but not all. For instance, one divider may be numbered 350 and the next one 400. Between the two divider cards there may be names coded 353, 350, 360, 364, 365, and 355, but instead of being in numerical order they are inter-filed alphabetically by given

Such prefixes to surnames as "van," "Von," "Di," "de," "le," Di," "D'," "dela," or "du" are sometimes disregarded in alphabetizing and in coding.



Reviewed by George Anderson

Three new books are reviewed in this issue of The Roots Tracer. All are data compilations worth searching by LAGS members. All are now on the shelf at our library in the Carnegie Building in Livermore.

Marriages of Some American Residents and Guide to Documents. Volume I. August, 1986.

--, **Volume II.** October, 1986.

Compiled and published by Yates Publishing Company, P.O.Box 237, Ozark, MO 65721. Soft cover, 8 1/2 x 11 inches, 193 pages (Vol. I), 245 pages (Vol. II). \$8.00 per volume.

If you pick up each new issue of The Genealogical Helper and, full of hope, turn to the index to see if someone else is finally publishing something about your Zutz family, you will often find -- Eureka! -- There it is! -- "Zutz, T021." Turning quickly to page 21, you see a page full of surnames, including Zutz, in microscopic print. Elation turns to deflation. Now you remember biting on that one every two months.

This manic-depressive event is brought to you by the Yates Publishing Company of Ozark, Missouri, who bought page 21 and surrounding pages for advertising its Family Group Sheet Exchange. Yates also publishes Marriages of Some American Residents and Guide to Documents, the subject of this review.

The family group sheet exchange conducted by Yates requires you to send in a family group sheet and a check for \$8., in return for which you receive free any and all (up to 40) family group sheets already on file for that surname. Yates will also put your pedigree chart into its files without charge and will publicize the names on it.

Yates has distilled these two volumes of Marriages of Some American Residents and Guide to Documents from its data banks of group sheets and pedigree charts. More volumes are apparently on the way. We have the first two volumes in our LAGS library. In my opinion, we also ought to add any future sequels.

There is no difference in kind between the two books -- evidently the volumes are being released as data entry and reduction proceeds. Perhaps each volume contains as much information as the Yates computer can handle at once. Here are some statistics: Volume I has 8037 marriage records of length 110 bytes, each containing full name of bride and groom, birth year and place for each, marriage year and place, and a number keyed to the source document. The entire file is printed twice, once alphabetically by groom, and again alphabetically by bride. Source documents (747 in Volume I) are listed twice, once by key numer and once alphabetically by author. Volume II has somewhat more (10,935) marriage records but fewer (513) cited documents.

At the end of Volume II is the list of surnames used by Yates in the GH ads, again printed in 6-point type. Almost 13,000 different surnames appear in this list. Only one surname (Welhoff) from my ancestry was missing from the 13,000. However, not one of my ancestors that I know about appears in the marriage lists.

There is little chance to assess the accuracy of the data as printed, and even less chance to detect errors in the data submitted to Yates. I spotted only one obvious data entry error in Volume I, but 7 in Volume II. A curious pattern in Volume II makes me suspicious of error: up to the letter "E" in the alphabetical listing by grooms, there are roughly the same number of entries derived from group sheets as from pedigree charts, while after that, almost every one is from pedigrees. A computer-wise publisher would insist on an explanation for such non-random behavior.

Marriages of Some American Residents and Guide to Documents is a set of books that all of our members should consult -- it provides a quick and easy index to masses of data.

In the spirit of experimental research, I decided to put the Yates Family Group Sheet Exchange to the test. I have submitted group sheets for my greatgrandfathers Samuel Black and John Flake and have paid my \$16. I will let readers of The Roots Tracer know in a future issue how well the system works.

Ancestors We Have Found. 1986. Harold Dwain Williams, Editor; Dale Smathers, Indexer. Published by the North San Diego County Genealogical Society, P.O.Box 581, Carlsbad, CA 92008. Soft cover, 8 1/2 x 11 inches, 353+viii pages, indexed, no price given.

This book is like our own LAGS Surname Index in purpose, but is larger and has some interesting differences in the way it is organized. Our book (with supplement) contains 1620 different surnames on 54 pages. Ancestors We Have Found contains 3870 different surnames on 361 pages. The discrepancy in surnames/page is accounted for by the way the San Diego book is organized: it is largely given over to ancestor charts of the sort we have begun printing in The Roots Tracer. The full name of each known ancestor of each member of the society is listed, with date and place of birth, marriage and death, if known. In contrast, our book lists only surnames. For each locality associated with that surname, we list only one date or range of dates. The result is that the San Diego book contains a great deal of information -- including kinship information -- that ours does not. It may be that when we have printed enough of our members' charts in The Roots Tracer we will want to collect them into a book like Ancestors We Have Found.

To test the book from San Diego, I searched for a number of names in my family. I quickly found that, if we ever do publish a book like this, we will need a better index. The problem is that many of the ancestor charts are over 10 pages long, with 50 names/page, but the index refers you only to the member's name, so you end up scanning through hundreds of names to find the one the index lists. The book looks like it has been computerized, so it would have been a simple matter to list both the member's name and the ancestor's number in the index. The penalty would have been increasing the size of the index from 30 to perhaps 45 pages.

My search finally did produce a hit. I now have a name in Carlsbad, California, to correspond with about the Mullikins of Maryland!

Are genealogists addicted to word play? You might think so to read the titles of genealogy magazines advertised in the most recent issue of The Genealogical Helper. I was so intrigued by a few titles that caught my eye that I compulsively pored over the whole issue, writing down example after outrageous example. There were at least 33. Most were simply alliterative: The Bennington Bunch, The Thornton Throng, Phillips Family Finder. A few were punning: Trees Company, The Knight Letter, One I could hardly believe was a rhyme: A Crump on Every Stump! But my favorite was The O'Dell Diggin's -- I guess if your name is O'Dell and you get teased often enough about Digger O'Dell, the comic undertaker, you might as well join in the fun and name your newsletter after him. A few that I didn't see (I think I'll copyright them) were Rodeau Rooter, The Budd Light, Bumpp Kin and Kiepers Finders.
